April Trip to Haiti

Sr. Francis' last trip to Haiti in April showed that improvements are going on even though they are slow. She observed feeding programs in our schools and met some of the students and teachers who received help from us. Our doctor, Sr. Mary Ann Cruz continues to do amazing work and is helped by monies and medical supplies that are sent. These few pictures of her tell more than 1,000 words. She was nominated doctor of the year

through Miami. While she wasn't chosen, she was chosen in our hearts and we found her more than deserving of this award. As you know, money was raised to get her a vehicle to travel up and down the mountain and to transport patients.

The vehicle was purchased for \$10,000 and \$500 was given for gas and Sr. Mary Ann's traveling expenses.

Sr. Francis was able to see the orphanage that was opened. It is a small





orphanage yet seeing the orphans more than melts your heart. Our Sisters talked of the pain the children had adjusting and how they were always asking for their parents. As time passed, they were asking less and less and were getting adjusted. Since her visit, we have opened a second orphanage. In the future we can help to support the orphans as well as our other efforts.









News of Japan

Just a little note to let you know that our Sisters in Japan are back to doing the ministries they had before - most of them work in education. But for several months after the earthquake and tsunami our Sisters were out among the people, doing whatever they could to help the needy - whether orphans or widows or anyone in need - sometimes just being there to talk with and to pray with people. Our Mother General twice tried to schedule a visit to our Sisters in Japan, but the Provincial Superior asked her to postpone her visit "because we still have aftershocks almost every day, and we are worried about you getting affected by the radiation..."

We are very proud of our Sisters and their going out of their normal ministries to help the people. They still do what they can. Please keep them and all the people of Japan in your prayers. With the land in so many areas contaminated, and so much destruction, life is still hard, and we can not say that it

Japan Still Needs Help and Prayers

I received a note thanking us for the money that was donated for the East Japan earthquake and tsunami. The money was distributed to our schools in Sendai and Morioka that were damaged by earthquake to help with the repairs and to help the students.

Seven months have passed since the enormous earthquake and tsunami happened. People have gradually gone back to the stricken area to rebuild and to try go on with life, however many victims are still forced to a life as evacuees. There is increased pain and suffering for the refugees by the nuclear plant accident. They have much to bear.

A part of me considers Spain as the place of my spiritual awakening. As we toured the city of Madrid, I saw the connection between people, places, and events and the time we arrived from the airport. There was a sacredness; a connection with the Divine where deity was to live like in Avila where St. Theresa and St. John of the Cross were baptized or St. Isidore's uncorrupted body, St. James' mission place and of course our own patron St. Paul missionary journey. My gut feeling was like I was receiving the faith from these beginnings and our ancestry. I quote from St. Paul's letter to the Colossians 2:6-7. "So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in Him, rooted and built up in Him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness". These words are powerful and awesome; they helped me in my reflection day by day in Madrid. I was living the realization that Spain baptized and Christianized the Philippines way back in 1521. Coming to this pilgrimage allowed me to focus as I stepped on the roads of Madrid on the Roots of my Christianity which is a vital part of my faith and belief. My very being should be rooted and built up in Him." My life then ought to be rooted and built up in Jesus who gave me nourishment everyday as I go to Mass and my daily prayer with Him and

in Him. My experience of getting lost in the wide airfield early at dawn caused me to stop and pause. I stayed in the shelter where the Eucharist was placed during the night and said, "Lord, I should not get lost. Let me get back to the place where I was." I started humming the tune to the Lord is My Shepherd whenever I got lost as I tried to figure out where to go. With trust and with faith I walked knowing Jesus was with me. I was surprised to find



and arrive in the place where my group was still in their panchos inside their sleeping bags in a damp space after the rain. My heart was filled with love, gratitude and joy because of what the Lord was doing in my life. These experiences were telling me that I should continue to build, to be rooted and steadfast in faith with the God who called me from birth.

"Sister you might need water" The lady offered 2 bottles for me in the dark around 4 am. I woke up early because I wanted to go to the bathroom. First of all I thought that I didn't need water, but it wasn't true. I needed water to brush my teeth and wash my face. It was a little thing but I could feel the care of God for me.

I would like to share a highlight of my pilgrimage in Madrid, (World Youth Day). I journeyed with Jesus who manifested in me, "The good of my being lost when I met my good shepherd."

We all slept in the field where no one expected it would be like this. Some left because they were overwhelmed by the huge crowd. The number of the youth in



that area was about 1.5 million. After we took time to surrender and accept the situation, we had a space to lie down using the tarp which Greg prepared for us. We were packed like sardines. We slept even though we were wet from head to toe. I woke up to go to the bathroom. I thought I knew the way back by myself. On the way back I stopped at the drinking water tent. There a kind man offered a bottle of water to me. I started to walk back to our group but I could not find them. I met one of the youth; I think she came from Germany. She said, "Not only you are lost, I am lost too and I slept on the dusty street for 3 hours." I continued to walk in the dark among the people who were sleeping. I met many people who were trying to find their way back to their groups. "Don't give up you will find them," I told myself. I felt tired and my feet were sore. I sat down several times and drank the water which the good Lord gave to me through the kindness of people. Once again I met the young lady who slept on the dusty street. She found her group. She said,



"Sister, I will pray the Rosary for you, dawn is coming, by sunrise, you will see clearly and find your group. Don't give up."

What was the purpose of getting lost like this? I met many kind people who encouraged me to have hope. I sat on a chair in the dark and the moon was shining. I asked, "When will the sun come up?" Most of the people started to move as there was a wake up call. It was nine o'clock, and the Mass will start at 10:00. I still hadn't found my group. "Oh Lord, please help me. I am so tired and thirsty. All of my water is gone." One young lady from Russia ran to me. "Are you a Sisters of St. Paul de Chartres, Sister? I am so happy to see you. We work with your Sisters in Russia." My response didn't match her excited conversation. "I am lost. I can't find my group. Please help me." The priest from Russia and the lady suggested that I ask a volunteer to find my place.

The climax of my Journey started when the crowd moved to clear their places and arrange for the celebration of the Mass with Pope Benedict XVI. Most of the youth were standing beside the way where the Pope would pass by. I was in a corner. I saw him face to face. He smiled at me. I was so happy! I forgot my problem. My heart was filled with hope through the Pope, the Leader of the Church, who is a representative of Jesus Christ. Being lost ended up being good. If I hadn't gotten lost, I would not have seen the Pope face to face. I saw the youth jump and run to follow his pathway. This image showed the energy of the next generation who will follow Christ in the Catholic Church. "What shall I do now?" I asked the volunteers help to find my group. "Please show me your I.D." It is DI and not D3 like I thought. "Oh! How silly am I?"

Now I had I 5 minutes to find my group before the Mass started. So, I walked and passed the huge crowd to my group. I reported myself to my group with teary eyes: "I was lost, but it was good being lost because I saw the Pope and he smiled at me."

I felt that I received big grace to see the Pope and experience being a witness of Jesus Christ in my weakness, my being lost, and my hope for the youth. The Lord raised me up today. The Mass was magnificent. It was a true celebration for me who had been like a lost sheep. The good shepherd held me in his Heart. After I wandered for about 5 hours, I will never forget that the God of Mercy gave me a big joy to be a witness of Hope. My Lord surprised me each moment. How can I repay him? I will



share about My pilgrimage and what it meant to me.

We didn't have a chance to receive Jesus in Holy Communion but I received him in my desire to meet him. When we walked back after the Mass, I saw a huge, huge crowd of youth who were marching with joy to go out to spread the good news which they had experienced not by words but by their lives. I saw many nations walk with faith and hope. It was a wonderful image to see the youth who came and joined World Youth Day. We greeted each other with our smile and the sign language of love. I realized that "World Youth Day" was a sign of new hope because the Holy Spirit showed his power among the youth of the Catholic Church. It is a sign of unity, solidarity, and love. The youth don't like to listen to many words but they want to live as the witnesses of new hope. They want to have an experience, to see, and to feel.

I was not a candidate to go to Madrid, but by the plan of God, I went to Madrid as a witness of love. Thank you to the SPC Sisters who allowed me to deepen my spirituality and to experience the hope that I will see Christ in a single day. Shall I sing, "Eye has not seen, ear has not heard, what the Lord has prepared for those who love him"

The pilgrimage is not ended. We are pilgrims and we get lost several times but the Lord continues to come to us and bring us home. Thank you for all the Pilgrims who gave us a good example and shared their joy, laughter, and hope. It was a wonderful pilgrimage for me. The question I always ask... Am I strongly rooted in Christ? Are my spiritual roots expanding deeper and broader?

I pray and thank you God for giving me your Son Jesus and for all the inexhaustible supply of graces. May the water from above during the Vigil in Cuatro Vientos quench my thirst. May the spiritual food, your Holy Word, satisfy my hunger to grow in my spiritual maturity and remain ever faithful to Your calling, securely anchored and rooted in Christ to persevere in my religious vocation with joy and fidelity, to follow with courage and generosity the path He maps out for me.

Return to the Source: In the Hands of the Potter April 1-May 12, 2011

Forty days of Spiritual Renewal with 8 days Retreat included, is an experience to cherish. Coming back in the Potter's Hands at Our Lady of Chartres Convent in Antipolo City last April, deepened once again God's call coupled with His faithfulness. The feeling of coming back 25 years to the source, to encounter Jesus by reading the Scriptures and the life of our founder Fr. Louis Chauvet and listening to the input of the different speakers molds my life in a special way. The silence and rest were conductive to my listening to His words and His love. He is the person who journeys with me through sorrows, joys, concerns, anxieties, struggles, and fears. His manifestation among the Sisters, the people, places, events and experiences touches me as well as the fact that I touch them.

The day we had the topic on "Awakening the Mystic and Prophet Within" allowed me to be more conscious and come to terms with my real self. I experienced how God sees me in the light and darkness and I've come to see who I am in the eyes of God. He has been patient and creative in manifesting Himself to me. The very experience that I had during one of our exercises was about the Source of light that penetrated my whole body. The sparkling light that comes in and out of me embodied His great healing, mercy and love for me. The great Epiphany that I experienced was of the God who loves me in the deepest sense of my Beloved-ness to Him. He is my God who journeys with me through thick and thin.

Then came "Choosing the Worst Part", and I tried to turn the Gospel around like, "Lord, who do you say I am?" This challenged me to follow Him and commit myself totally to God by my Vows of chastity, poverty and obedience. This is the value of religious life in the mission. I reflected on the following quote "at heart, religious life is prophecy. In the line of the prophets of Israel, the religious are to be God's watch people." It is my duty to warn others in times of danger or infidelity, to remind them of God's word, and to call them to conversion. Thus, I am building on the foundation of the apostles and the prophets. So I pondered; is my vow of chastity a daily gazing in the perspective of Jesus on the cross by loving more people with passion and compassion? Am I embracing all even if not loved by all,



sometimes feeling alone with the Alone? With the vow of poverty, did I give a generous solidarity and justice with the poor around me in the community and my neighbor? Am I involved in the ongoing search for the lost sheep and the search for the little ones? With the vow of obedience, did I posses a limitless listening to the voice of the God who calls me? Challenging indeed, a kenosis of a missionary religious. I constantly remind myself that I don't own my religious vocation. It is a gift from God and the vows I profess to the public has to be life giving! It is a gift given to me and to be shared with others for the sake of the kingdom and to make disciples to all nations, "...as the father has sent me so I am sending you to bear fruit that lasts."

My prayer is that the Lord shape me into a vessel of His grace, a vessel that can hold His Divine grace and pour that grace out on the people whom I come close.







Miracles Do Happen

We would like to share with you a letter that was received so together we can rejoice at what God is doing.

My dear sister,

On December 13th, 2010 you came to my sick bed and through the power of JESUS performed a miracle. You might question why I am contacting you 6 months later. I can only say that until now I just did not know what to say.

Let me first relate to you the events of that day from my memory. On the previous Wednesday I had major back surgery at Marquette General Hospital. I was due to be released on Saturday of that week. However, my bowels did not restart and I was kept longer. By Monday my condition had deteriorated. I was in total organ failure and the doctors had told me that I might not live through the day. At about noon you came to my bedside and asked what my condition was, and for me to put your hand on my problem area. This is where our recollection might differ immensely. I immediately felt the power of your touch radiate through my body. You might remember me frantically trying to touch your face. I wanted all of that power I could take in. I am sure that during that period you were praying for me. However, I heard not another word spoken for quite some time. I was having a spiritual conversation with a heavenly spirit. I saw that my love and faith in our Lord was perfect and the love for me was unconditional. It was a perfect moment not stained by the weakness of the flesh. During this time of ecstasy I shouted in my mind "Are you Mary?" You clearly turned to me and said one word "JESUS".

I heard not another spoken word until I suddenly returned to a physical awareness and you were saying you came to the hospital on Mondays and Thursdays. Recalling the event a couple days later my wife and I never recall you coming into the room or introducing yourself. We seriously considered the fact that you might have been an apparition. It was only days later when we investigated your presence, that we found out you were a real person.

Within the hour my bowels came alive and all my organ systems returned into

normal ranges. By five the next morning all my blood tests, which only twelve hours earlier were grossly abnormal, were perfect. My clearly relieved physicians could not discharge me fast enough. To this day my recovery is progressing nicely.

Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help

Several of us took a day trip to Green Bay, Wisconsin to visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help. It is a simple shrine yet a holy place and our hearts were touched by the presence of Mary and Jesus. We were able to attend mass there and to pray for you.

Now maybe you don't know anything about the Shrine. The 1850's were a time of great immigration to Wisconsin. Among the Belgium immigrants of 1855 was a family from the province of Brabant with a daughter Adele Brise who lost her eye as a young child. She was known for her fervent piety, simple religious ways, and confidence in the intercession of the Blessed Virgin.

Our Lady appeared to her in October of 1859. Adele first saw our Lady standing between two trees while on her way to the grist mill. In one of her encounters, Adele asked after being counseled, "In God's name who are you and what do you want of me?"

The Lady said, "I am the Queen of Heaven...Gather the children in this wild country and teach them what they should know for salvation...

Teach them their catechism, how to sign themselves with the sign of the Cross, and how to approach the sacraments; that is what I wish you to do. God and fear nothing. I will help you."

Trip to South Bend

By 8:00 p.m. everything was ready to be loaded in the car early the next day.

The Sisters planned to be all in the car at 4:00 a.m. You can just imagine the time of our rising in order to be down in the garage right on time. I could not sleep thinking of our trip. So I was down at 3:45. I wanted to help the Sisters load the car but they were done doing them before I came. Sr. Gloria was in Escanaba so we agreed to meet at a parking lot in Rapid River by 5:00. She left Escanaba at 4:30. She made a good calculation. We both arrived almost the same time at the parking lot of an apartment building. We transferred all our provisions into the van that Sr. Gloria was driving and started on our journey toward St. Ignace on U.S. 2. We had a quick breakfast at McDonalds before crossing the Mackinaw Bridge down to South Bend, IN.

The Sisters made this trip to visit and see the "Women and Spirit: Catholic Sisters in America" exhibit at the Center for History in South Bend, Indiana. This traveling exhibit is sponsored by the Leadership Conference of Women Religious. While in South Bed, the exhibit is at the Center for History. The Sisters of the Congregation of Holy Cross offer free housing for women religious at their Motherhouse at Saint Mary's, Notre Dame, Indiana.

The display features photographs and information telling the story of each congregation's founding, history, mission and charism, and past and present ministries in the United States and in countries around the world. Each community's habit is on display, along with a photograph of Sisters wearing the habit. It also gives a brief history of the garment.

Women and Spirit: Catholic Sisters in America reveals the mystery behind a small group of American Women who helped shape our country. First arriving in America nearly 300 years ago the Sisters have opened schools, colleges, and hospitals. They also have provided social services that have served our people.
