Missing Sr. Francis Mortola!

In our last newsletter, we informed you that Sr. Francis was returning to the Philippines. We are missing her a great deal and want to share more about her life while she was in District USA as well as an update on what is happening now.

Sr. Francis arrived as a missionary in the United States in April of 1985. In the summer of the following year, she went with Sr. Editha and Sr. Marie Claire to open the mission in Washington, D.C. where she was the local superior and served in Nativity School and in pastoral ministry at Nativity Parish until 1997. She was then transferred to Marquette, Michigan where she served as pastoral coordinator of St. Christopher Parish until 1999.

Sr. Francis then returned to the Philippines to be with her mother who was very ill and dying. In 2001 she returned to the United States and served the Native Americans until 2003. After that she returned to the Philippines.

While Sr. Francis was in the Philippines, she was sent to San Francisco to open a mission there where she served as local superior and worked in pastoral ministry until 2006. The end of that year she returned to the Philippines where she worked at Mount St. Paul until she returned to the United States in 2008

After Sr. Francis returned, she served as local superior in Marquette and ministered at Our Lady Help of Christian Center serving the poor at Sawyer at the former Air Force Base. The name was later changed to St. Francis Connection Center. She was available to the people who came to the Center and helped with the food distribution programs as well as spiritual needs.

While this tells a little about what Sr. Francis did in the States, it does not tell how she touched our lives and tremendous difference that her presence made in District USA. Everyone that knows Sr. Francis, knows something about the delicious food that she prepared or something about her baking skills. We are all missing her talents and the ways that she shared these skills.

For us as Sisters of St. Paul, we are missing her on even more important levels. She brought a wealth of experience in community. She shared that experience as a local superior and as a council member. She always had excellent ideas and a listening ear. She was also a witness to us of how to live community life. Her faith and love of God were

an inspiration. She gave endlessly of her time, talent and gift of herself. I could go on and on about the ways Sr. Francis touched our lives. Instead, I invite you to remember the ways she touched your life, to give thanks for her, and to pray for her.



Sr. Francis now lives in Cagayan de Oro City which is her home town. She



lives with 8 other Sisters in the local community at Maria Reyna-Xavier University Hospital. She helps Sr. Pureza Arana who is the head of pastoral care at the hospital. She visits the patients which average about 110 patients each day.

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Sr. Francis is also using her gifts as a baker so this is good news. She is doing some baking that is sold in the canteen of the Sisters at the hospital. While we miss the benefits of her baking, it is good to know that others are benefiting from her great gifts and talent.

As you know, the purpose of her return to the Philippines was to be near her sister, Delsa. Delsa still lives in Cagayan de Oro so Sr. Francis is very near. She connects with her often to

check on her and is available to travel with Delsa for doctor's appointments. It is a good arrangement.

Many are asking for Sr. Francis address so I am including it in the newsletter for your convenience if you so desire. It is as follows:

My Vocation Story

My vocation to the religious life came quietly as I grew up in a devout Catholic family. My second to the eldest brother, Francisco entered the Diocesan Formation Seminary in Cebu City the same year I was born. He was ordained April 12, 1964, few days before my graduation from Elementary School.

During the preparations, close and even distant relatives came to help. It was the whole towns' affair when a priest is ordained. Some relatives and friends of my father and mother would pick on me and always asked me if I want to become a sister. I always answered I don't know.

I can't remember when I started to memorize basic prayers. Guess it could be the constant hearing, mimicking, repeating as we usually pray the rosary together at night before we all go to bed. We were trained to be home before 6pm for the Angelus and when we forget, the church bells reminded us it was time to go home. During high school I joined the Legion of Mary and took the Devotion to Our Lady of Lourdes. I always felt close to Mama Mary even when I felt I was farthest away from God during my college days. Sunday masses stopped being a priority in my schedule. But when it was Wednesday and there was novena -mass to our Mother of Perpetual Help, I was always drawn to it. It is because every time I got sick (I had regular bouts with asthma as a child) I always asked her favor to heal me of the sickness and she always did.

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Like many families, we had our struggles and problems to face when we were growing up. We just stopped going to mass together, and praying the rosary together. I was disillusioned with what I was seeing about the religious and parish priests in our diocese and the Catholic Church.

I also dreamt of meeting the perfect guy and having my own family. I had my childhood friend in high school and felt both our families approved of our friendship, hoping it can develop into a lifelong commitment. But deep in my heart I knew he was not whom my heart desires. I could not imagine giving myself to him and living with him forever.

I started to entertain other suitors and go out dating after college to find my ideal guy, but there was always something I was looking for and I was not always sure about my own feelings for the other. I told myself, I should love that man so much so that I would be willing to make a leap with him in the dark and not feel sorry for the decision I made. I again begged Mama Mary to help me find the best man she could give.

After working for almost 2 years in a district hospital in our town, that time allowed me to see and enjoy life with the love and attention from my mother, company of friends, satisfaction from work, having a salary of my own, but still feeling incomplete. After spending a long time of prayer and discernment, I surrendered and stopped running away from what was really haunting me. I was too shy to admit I wanted to become a sister. Some friends thought it was a waste of opportunities, and my mother feared I will not be able to withstand the discipline and hard work inside the convent.

That was the kind of feeling I was waiting for! The leap in the dark! The decision to enter was the very first major disobedience I ever made in my life. I also doubted that I don't have what it takes, I felt unworthy, but the urge, the call and desire was stronger. Mother Mary was giving me the best man ever she could give, her own Son Jesus!

I found my way through the Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres at Cebu Doctors Hospital. I worked with them for a while and finally entered the convent in 1977. My mother waited for me to come home, my boyfriend visited me before my first profession in

1980 to find out if my decision was final. I have found him and I allowed myself to be found. I'm happy and will do whatever or go wherever it takes me if it is according to His will..

The Sisters in the Philippines have well organized health care, education programs, and pastoral ministry with clear goals and mission statements that are understood by all. The Sisters carry the love of Jesus with great zeal and give without counting the cost.

Praying each day with the Sisters and visiting some of our schools, hospitals, retreat houses and local communities has greatly enriched my life. Seeing the way others share in our mission and seeing the Sisters share the love of Jesus and their constant warm welcome will live within me and remains a great gift to me.

I wish you could have seen the program that they presented that showed who they are as a people in music and dance as well as our history as a Congregation and in the Philippines. The food was very delicious and I tried many new things.

I cannot end without telling you that we saw Sr. Lucienne, Sr. Anne Charles, Sr. Marie Claire, Sr. Francis Mary, Sr. Cristina and Sr. Rosella. Of course, we saw many other Sisters however these are Sisters who served in the United States and that many of you remember. I am happy to report that they are all doing well. They send their love and I extended ours and yours to them as well.

I cannot thank the Sisters of the Philippine province enough for inviting us and for giving us such a rich experience of prayer, of our

roots, of love, of their culture, and the gifts of their music, dance and creativity. Thank you God for all the Sisters in the Philippines. May we have the grace to follow their example to share the gift of who we are and your love with everyone with the same zeal for building your Kingdom.





Mission Projects

Before explaining the projects, I would like to say a gigantic thank you to those of you who have donated in the past. We are really making a difference.

We are keeping the projects we had last year and adding Central Africa to the list. We continue with our own Catholic Schools in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, the poor in Haiti, and helping victims who have been human trafficked. Since we have done these for several years, I am giving a simple explanation and adding an explanation of Central Africa.

1. Catholic Schools in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan

We know of parents who are struggling to keep their children in a Catholic School so we will continue to help the ten Catholic Schools of the Marquette Diocese to provide a scholarship for a student(s) who cannot afford the tuition.

2. Victims of Human Trafficking

We are helping Hope House run by Sr. Jean Schafer and Sr. Sheila Novak who started this house in California to help victims of human trafficking. If you would like to learn more about Hope House check out www.stopenslavement.org.

3. Haiti

You are all well aware that Haiti is one of the poorest countries in the world and the earthquake has made living conditions more difficult. We have eight schools in Haiti and one health clinic as well as orphans. At times our Sister's needs are not met and we will also help with their needs. The Sister's house in Delma collapsed due to termites and needs to be rebuilt. The school that collapsed in Delma during the earthquake also needs to be rebuilt. They have been having class in tents and temporary buildings.

4. Central Africa

We have Sisters in Central Africa and we would like to help them in 2 areas. In Boda, there are about 1,400 refugees camping on our property. They

have need of food and other supplies for their health and personal hygiene. In Bossambele, the convent was stripped of all belongings and damage to it was made during the conflict, so the house has to be practically rebuilt. We would like to help with rebuilding and repairs, and furnishing rooms with the necessary furniture.



Mission Projects Report

For the 6th year of our Mission Projects, 2013 –2014 we were able to collect and distribute \$18,981.00.

The Haiti Mission received \$8,981.00

The Victims of Human Trafficking—Hope House received \$5,500.00



The Catholic Schools of the Upper Peninsula received \$4500.00 with each of the ten schools receiving \$450.00 for student scholarships.

As of November 20th for the 7th year of our Mission projects, 2014—2015 which kicked off in October we have received \$7,096.00 in donations. We had our Compassionate Hearts Club mailing at NMU Catholic Campus Ministry on October 8th.

Although with student schedule conflicts the volunteers were fewer then other years, we did have a few hard working volunteers that made it and we were thankful for.


