AUTOBIOGRAPHY

I, Sr. Marie Claire was born on May 25, 1929 to Hermogenes & Anastcia Tuballa in Dauin, Negros Oriental, Philippines.

I am the eldest of four children. I have a brother Jose who is a year and seven months younger and a second one, Francisco who is three and a half years younger. I had a sister, Remedios, the youngest who died in 1993 at the age of 56. My father was a police officer in the city of Dumaguete and my mother was a homemaker and a self employed storekeeper.

I received my vocational call in the second grade after my first communion and again as a sophomore in High School at St. Paul College of Dumaguete. I joined the Congregation in Quezon City in Manila after my first year in college on April 1, 1950. I entered the novitiate on December 8, 1950, took my first vows on May 31, 1953 and my final vows on May 31, 1959.

I ministered in SPC Bocaue, Bulacan as a third grade teacher from 1953 to 1958. In 1958 I was transferred to SPC of Surigao where I taught Kindergarten and took care of the CCD Program for ten years.

In 1968, Mother Madeleine, the first Filipino Provincial sent me as a missionary to the US after receiving my Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education. I ministered in St. Christopher's parish in Marquette as a third grade teacher and CCD classes. I received my Master degree at Northern Michigan University in the summer of 1974. After three years in Marquette I transferred to St. Williams School in Menominee to teach fourth grade and helped teach in the CCD program in the parishes. After the consolidation of churches and school in Menominee, I was sent to Catholic Central South to teach with the Franciscan Sister of Manitowoc up to 1986.

In 1986, I was transferred to nativity Catholic Academy in Washington DC as a fourth grade teacher and sixth grade CCD teacher. I ministered at the Church of Nativity and at Nativity Catholic Academy for 18 years. At the end of the school year 2003-2004, I was asked to move back to Marquette, Michigan where the motherhouse of the Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres is located.

“Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you....”

Jeremiah 1:5



I do believe that God created each one of us for a very special purpose. My mother was raised by her aunt and uncle who were both single, after her own mother died when she was an infant. After she was married to my dad her aunt invited them to stay and live with them since there was enough room in the house. My great aunt then was influential in the religious upbringing of their children. I was the eldest, my two brothers were in the middle, and my sister was the youngest. My aunt was very religious and a devoted catholic lady. In fact, she wanted to enter the Poor Clares Convent when she was young but was prevented to do so.

We prayed the Angeles in Latin every 6:00 p.m. when the church bell rang. That meant we had to be in the house before 6. Evening prayers and the rosary were said at 8:00 p.m. On Sunday afternoons we had Catechism at home or we listened to stories of the lives of the saints and learned our prayers in Spanish and in the dialect. At 4:00 we went to church again for the Rosary and Benediction. My great aunt lived in the house like she was a Religious and looked after the four of us when my parents were out or at work. My brothers and sister thought she was our grandmother at first, but she told us that she was our mother's aunt.

Every year during Lent she invited young Sodality members of the parish for an eight-day retreat at home. She herself directed the retreat by using the Exercises of St. Ignatius. She had the book and I saw it myself. I had no idea where she learned how to give retreats. All I heard was she had studied with the Daughters of Charity in Cebu when she was

young. There was complete silence around the house the whole week. I only heard the sound of a little bell, their vocal prayers, conferences, and someone who read aloud during their meals. My family had to observe the silence too, and would speak in a low voice when we needed to communicate with each other.

I must have been 5 or 6 years old when my mother took me along with her to a Eucharistic Congress held at a park in the city. Dumaguete, the capital of our province, is about seven miles north of my hometown. After the outdoor mass, my mother and I went around to see the different booths and

displays in the area. It was that special occasion when I saw two Sisters of St. Paul for the first time in my life. They were standing by their booth selling religious articles. They smiled at everyone who approached them and were very friendly and welcoming. I whispered to my mother and asked her who they were or were they human beings like all of us. I thought they were some kind of angels because they were both dressed in white from head to foot. I even wondered if they ever did all the things people do, like eating and sleeping. I was so impressed by their appearance and graciousness that I kept thinking about them. After we got home, I took a white bed sheet, covered myself from my head, except my face and went in the front of the mirror and admired myself looking funny when all of a sudden I heard my mother asking what I was doing. I smiled at her and told her that I was just playing nun.

I went to the Public School for my Elementary Education. When I was ready to go to High School I asked my father if I could go to the Provincial High School in the city. There were only 2 high schools then, the Provincial and the Sisters of St. Paul College High School. He told me it

was better for me to go to the Sisters of St. Paul High School. Thanks be to God and to my father! This was the school where I got to know the Sisters so well and learned to love them all. They were not only the best teachers, but they were so kind and very attentive to all the girls. Our homeroom teachers were all Sisters who showed interest in whatever we did and were always ready to help us with our little problems. I was very attracted to their way of life and their charity towards the students. They were always happy and smiling when you met them and were prayerful. I started thinking of becoming one of them one day but was not really serious about it yet. I also wanted to be a school teacher.



Then I went to college and before the end of the year I experienced a strong desire in my heart to become one of the Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres. My desire grew stronger when one of the Sisters asked me, when I was entering the convent. It was a surprise for me since I never told anyone that I was interested to be a nun. The next day I dared

knock on the office door of the Mother Superior, who was French and the Dean of the College Department at the same time and told her about my strong desire and intention. I was so nervous and could hardly wait for her answer. Right away, Mother Marguerite told me to write Sr. Anne Patrice in Quezon City and told her about my desire. The following week I received a letter from Sr. Patrice telling me I was most welcomed. I was very happy and excited and thanked God for listening to my prayer.



My big problem was, I did not know how to tell my mother about my plans. I know I would not be

allowed to leave my family and enter the convent. My father had passed away four years earlier when I was 16 and I was the eldest of 2 brothers and a little sister. But the Sisters told me to go home and ask permission. So I went home and asked my mother if it was fine with her if I went with 2 Sisters who were going to Manila the next month. She cried bitterly because she was suspicious that I might not come home anymore. She told me she was not giving me her permission, but if I insisted I could do whatever I wanted but she was not in favor that I enter the convent. Anyway, I prayed harder and my mother and sister

saw me off at the airport on the day of my departure. I knew I broke the hearts of my whole family but my daily prayers were that God was going to take care of them and not leave them alone.

In later years I realized God took care of my mother, my 2 brothers, and sister in my absence. They all worked hard and the Lord has blessed them up to the present time with beautiful children and grandchildren, even a great granddaughter. Without my presence at home and my help, my family has enough of everything they need and grateful to God for His many blessings each day. My family is very happy and proud that I am a Sister of St. Paul and I love them dearly and proud of them, too. God is so good all the time.

Everyday I thank God for His call and for my wonderful family. Most of all I thank the Lord for the many blessings He has bestowed each day on my whole family. I also thank God for my Congregation, my Province, and my District USA. On my part, with God's help, I am very happy as a Sister of St. Paul and I never have regretted that I entered the Religious Life.



NOTE FROM SR. MARIE CLAIRE

It was a cool evening in September when the plane I was on landed at the old airport in Negaunee. I felt alone in the crowd when I knew I was in the other side of the world away from my homeland, the Philippines. But when I saw the familiar faces of Mother Charles, our last French provincial of the Philippines and Sr. Anne Patrice, my formator in the Novitiate, my eyes brightened and my spirit was filled with great joy and excitement. This was forty-five years ago. I felt at home right away wherever I was



assigned and then enjoyed whatever I was doing. I developed a love for my Religious family and a love for teaching children in the grade schools.

I have been happy and so grateful to God for the blessings He has given me during my 36 years of teaching in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and in Washington, D.C. Whenever I was sent to a place of work, I was happy and easily adjusted myself to the people around me and with people I worked with; not that I am perfect but because I was sure God was with me.

Right now, I have mixed feelings in my heart and soul so that I find it difficult to express them in words. Of course, I love the land of my birth, the Philippines; and I also learned to love the U.P. and I feel I am a Yooper, too. I love my beautiful Philippines and I love my adopted country, as well. It was a big decision for me to make and a big transition for me. I have to die to myself.

As St. Paul told the Corinthians in his first letter to them that there are three things that last: faith, hope, and love; but the greatest is love. God is love. Everything passes; only God remains. So nothing really lasts. I think what is necessary is the living of the present moment because nothing lasts except God. Therefore, I have to be ready for my next mission. God calls. I also find it difficult to express in words, my love and gratitude to my dear Sisters in the District, all my friends and acquaintances, for your great kindness to me and your love and support you have given me all these years. My District USA, the Diocese of Marquette, and all of the Yoopers will be forever in my heart and prayers. Thank you so much for everything! Goodbye...

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Compassionate Heart's Club—sixth year!

I would like to say a gigantic thank you to those of you who have donated to the Compassionate Heart's Club. We are really making a difference.

We have no changes in our projects this year. We continue with our own Catholic Schools in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, the poor in Haiti, and helping victims who have been human trafficked.

In case you need a reminder of what the projects support here is a fuller explanation:

1. Catholic Schools in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan

We know of parents who are struggling to keep their children in a Catholic School so we will continue to help the nine Catholic Schools of the Marquette Diocese to provide a scholarship for a student(s) who cannot afford the tuition. We believe in the value of a Catholic education so we would like to aid the schools in their ministry of educating our children with good Catholic morals, a deeper understanding of the Catholic faith, good discipline as well as a well-rounded education.

2. Victims of Human Trafficking

Many victims are human trafficked around the world as well as here in the United States. They are exploited for purposes of commercial sex, including prostitution, stripping, pornography and live-sex shows. However, trafficking also take place as labor exploitation, such a domestic servitude, sweatshops factories, or migrant agricultural work. Traffickers use force, which could be rape, beatings, and confinement, fraud and coercion to compel women, men and children to engage in these activities.

This year we again want to help Hope House run by Sr. Jean Schafer and Sr. Sheila Novak who started this house in California to help victims of human trafficking. Hope House offers a home-like atmosphere to women who, because of a situation of enslavement, have spent time in a shelter or emergency housing, but are now ready to undertake the journey toward personal growth and self-esteem development. Hope

House can take up to 5 women who can stay up to 24 months if they are attending educational and vocational programs. Residents with work permits contribute to their room and board and establish savings accounts to prepare for a life of self-reliance.

It takes approximately \$790.00 per month per woman to provide room, board and basic services like bus passes, doctors, and dentists. Monies will also help to cover such things as counseling and psychological needs assessment, education, resume writing and interviewing skills and job search and employment guidance. It will go directly to the help with the needs of the women who were trafficked.

3. Haiti

You are all well aware that Haiti is one of the poorest countries in the world and the earthquake has made living conditions more difficult. We have eight schools in Haiti and one health clinic. They are in desperate need of medicine to serve the poor. Help is needed to sponsor student's tuitions in our schools and beyond the level of education that we offer.

We also need help to pay teacher's salaries and to give them a raise. At present, \$20.00 a month for 10 months (\$200.00) pays for the tuition, the uniform, and a pair of shoes for a student. A teacher's salary is \$40.00 a month for 10 months (\$400.00). We are also increasing our efforts to feed the children with a goal of sending a care package of food home as often as possible. There is also a great need to help with expenses of the orphans. So the list of what we can and are doing is endless.

We would deeply appreciate your support for our projects. You may donate money that will be divided between the 3 projects or you may donate for a specific project or a specific purpose. Just indicate what your intentions are. Thank you in advance for your generosity.
