Celebrating the Year of St. Paul and our General Chapter

Since the Holy Father named 2008 as the year of St. Paul, we, the Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres started out the year of St. Paul by holding a District Assembly on January 24-26, 2008 at our Motherhouse in Marquette, Michigan. Fr. Frank Lenz joined us on the 24th as we opened the District Assembly with the celebration of the Eucharist. Prayer and reflection on the epistles of St. Paul filled the day. We were delighted to have Bishop Garland celebrate mass on the 25th since it is the conversion of St. Paul. He blessed our pictures of St. Paul which came from Thailand.

At the District Assembly we spent time looking at how we could deepen our knowledge of the epistles of St. Paul as well as how the passionate love of Paul for Christ and his missionary zeal could become our love for Christ and our zeal for the Kingdom.

During our General Chapter which was held in Rome in September, we addressed the four doors asking ourselves how



we could be creative women in our day to carry on our charism. Like St. Paul we renew our missionary horizons. At the beginning of the 21st century, the Spirit of God calls us to renewal and universality, to become welcoming of persons and events, giving birth to change. We are called to step into the unknown, as our Sisters have done in the past. We go forward mindful that our history and our missionary foundations are steeped in Paschal Mystery.

The second door dealt with our spirituality which is Christocentric. It is lived out in the fullness of the Paschal Mystery. We were also called to take a look at the role of the Holy Spirit in our lives and the life of St. Paul. Following Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit, we will write a new chapter for the 21st century.

Like St. Paul's early Christian communities, we are called to build authentic religious communities. We draw our strength from community living in



order to spend ourselves in the mission. Therefore, we strive to make each community an image of the Trinitarian love. We are communities of a new Pentecost, where we become sisters who are happy and hospitable.

The fourth door calls all of us to become responsible for the unity and the future of the Congregation. We will do this through renewed processes and relationships in governance. This calls for flexibility, shared responsibility, accountability, teamwork and fraternal support. This demands conversion of heart, formation and participative leadership.

Throughout all of our discussions of the doors, the spirit of St. Paul was moving us. He was a great missionary so he truly is our model and guide. Sr. Myriam Kitcharoen, the head of our Congregation, has called us to be women of a new era who are guided by the Spirit of Easter and Pentecost and who are determined today, to move forward. She said, "Being women of the future and strong with the hope that dwells within us, let us move on, filled with confidence, to announce Jesus Christ!"

On the 26th our Friends of St. Paul joined us for a morning of recollection. Fr. Jeff



Johnson celebrated the mass. We renewed our vows and our Friends of St. Paul renewed their commitment. In the afternoon we chose to undertake three projects of outreach during the year. We started with our own Upper Peninsula. Working with Child Family Services, we will help to take care of some of the children in need. Our mission in Haiti spoke to our hearts so we will raise money to send to our Sisters in Haiti to help rebuild the schools that were destroyed by the mud slides from the heavy rain. We also want to help Mr. Covit, a 93 year old man in Venezuela, to make a simple yet effective system that will collect and purify the rain water so that they will have safe drinking water. As it is now, they suffer greatly from dysentery, especially the children. We are excited about our efforts to reach out and raise money for those in need.

So taking the theme of the Chapter we move forward in the Marquette Diocese and throughout the world, strong in hope and with tranquil daring in our hearts. Leaving fear behind, we are women who choose love.

She left for Washington, D.C. on February 26th and started at St. Jane de Chantal on the 3rd of March. We give thanks for her generous heart and spirit.

Sr. Therese Vu does not have a transfer however there have been some changes. She was and is working as head of the Pastoral Care Department at the Bishop Noa Home. She has moved from a 6 hour day to full time. This will give her more opportunity to visit with the residents at the Bishop Noa Home or in the hospital as well as to add things to bereavement follow-up for our families. We are delighted that our service to our residents and families can be expanded.

Sr. Rosaline Charoentavit, who started her ministry in Trenary in December in Pastoral Ministry, finds herself loving her ministry. She has been well received and is giving her heart to those she ministers too as well as spreading great joy and enthusiasm. Among her many tasks, she helps with the RCIA, brings communion to the shut-ins, and helps with religious education as well as the teens. May the work of her hands and heart prosper.

In January Sr. Juliana Djo was named as the acting Superior for our Sisters at our Motherhouse in Marquette, Michigan. Sr. Rosalie Hughes started her 3 year term as local Superior in the Escanaba House on February 24, 2008, May the Holy Spirit guide both of you and give you wisdom.

Sr. Francis Mortola will be returning to the United States and will reside in Marquette, Michigan. We look forward to her return and thank God for sending her back. We do not know the date of her coming however it probably won't be until June or later. She needs surgery for a macular cyst so please keep her in your prayers.

Sister—Who are you?

“Give Me a Sign”

I am Sister Rosaline Charoentantavit. I was born in 1957, in Bangkok, Thailand. My vocation was started at home. I was raised by my family of a strong Catholic faith. My mom is a good Catholic. She used to teach me how to trust in God. She said several times, “I have a hard time to raise all of you because you don’t have a father. The Sacred Heart of Jesus is the head of my family. Whatever you do, he looks after you and will take care of you always. I can’t follow you in every step. God will take care of all of you as you co-operate with me.”

We prayed the rosary every night before we went to bed. In my house there was a big altar. There were a lot of holy statues: Jesus, Holy Mary, St. Joseph, saints, etc. My grandmother lit the candles and led us in prayer.

I am proud of my mom’s faiths that transferred into my life little by little. When I finished my high school at St. Joseph Convent, I wanted to know God’s will for my life. I went to have a retreat at the retreat center of Ursala’s Congregation. There were 19 young youth who were seeking God’s will and discerning their vocations. There were strict rules to discern our vocation. Keep silence all the time and listen to God’s will. Do not wear a watch;

do not talk to each other, and fast. I never had an experience like this before. It helped me to listen to God’s will very clearly. Sister said all the time that God’s presence was with us and taught us to be aware of God’s presence.

It was Holy Thursday (April 5, 1975). After the beautiful liturgy of the washing of feet and the great banquet of the last supper, I went to bed full of peace and joy. I had a severe stomachache about 9 p.m. The Sister brought me to the hospital. They found that I have appendicitis. I was scheduled to have an operation at 7 a.m. on Good Friday. Even though I was in pain, I knew it was the sign which I asked God to give in my discernment to answer his call. I asked God to show me what God’s plan was for my life.

It was 30 years ago and as a Sister of St. Paul of Chartres, I still try to be aware of the presence of God in my life through persons and events. There are a lot of good and bad mixed up in my life. One thing that I will ask him again



and again, “Please show me the signs even when I am in pain and suffering because at the end of my life I wish to live with you in eternal life.” I have happiness in my belief that Jesus is a great magician in my life. How I find him and this game of vocation as a religious in the SPC community is not finished until I have taken my last breath. How can I respond to his call to be like Jesus? “I am the true vine. You are my branches, you can do nothing without me.” My life is not my own at all. I want to be like you, Lord Jesus in the cross and your Glory also. Thank you Lord because of your mercy and kindness to me all the days of my life! You give me signs all the time. I trust in you. Amen.

Mission Projects

The Sisters of St. Paul and our Association of the Friends of St. Paul have decided to take on three mission projects this year and we are inviting you to join us. For the first one, we have decided to start in our own backyard. We have chosen to help the children of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan by assisting Child and Family Services who empower families and individuals with skills to care for themselves and others thus enhancing the quality of life. Child Family Services currently has 18 different programs that assist in a variety of ways from Foster Care, Adoption, parenting skills, housing assistance, before and after school programs, as well as abuse and delinquency prevention.

For the other two projects, we have turned globally. We have chosen to assist our own Sisters of St. Paul of Chartres in Haiti to rebuild schools for the children as they have been destroyed by the mudslides caused by the heavy rain. For the third project, we are off to Venezuela. With a lack of quality drinking water in the villages, many people suffer from sickness and even death. The children are the ones who suffer the most. A 93 year old man, who is the father of a friend of ours, has been working with many others to devise a system to collect and purify rain water that would

provide enough safe drinking water. We are joining his efforts.

So what are we doing and how can you help? Some are collecting cans and donating the returns. Others are saving change as one of their ways to help. Some are making sacrifices and donating what they save. Along with those and other creative ways that are thought of and done, cans for monetary donations will be put in many businesses that are willing to participate with us. Down the road we are also thinking of planning a fundraiser. If you live in our local area and know a business to approach, contact Sr. Gloria Schultz. Mission News from Korea

Ecology in Gyeseong High School.

For years, Gyeseong Girl's High School has been taking small steps in order to revive our ecosystem. We are feeding earthworms with leftovers from students' lunch, and using the earthworms' castings as fertilizer to grow tomatoes, peppers, zucchini, and cabbage. Moreover, we are making use of the water which has been used to wash rice. That water is processed with effective microorganisms and becomes fermented. We make the fermented rice water in order to reduce water pollution and recycle water resources. This is a part of our school's effort in environmental education.

The most critical task that the whole world should carry out is to restore our ecosystem.

'The Preferential Option for the Poor' must begin with our compassion for the planet by

1. Listening to the cries of the Earth, showing compassion for the ailing earthworm, the Earth's old companion. It is the precious ground healer that restores our dying soil, transforming waste material into useful fertilizers. Their own castings mixed with soil is of the highest quality fertilizer.
2. Being Alert to the Cries of Water. When washing rice, the nutrients get washed off. If this water with the nutrients flow into the sewer, the number of microorganisms soars at an abnormal rate. However, when we ferment the rice water using EM (Effective Microorganisms) we can prevent water pollution.

Since our school is located in the urban area, we lack green space and to compensate for the lack, we have just transformed a 662m²-roof deck of our High School into a roof garden with shrubs and flowers. Furthermore, in the little patch we have made along with the flower garden, members of our two environmental clubs – the Earthworm Club and the Fermented Rice Water Club – are going to grow vegetable crops, making full use of earthworms and rice water! *God has created the universe and entrusted us with its maintenance. We humans have the obligation to preserve our ecosystem so that future generations will still be able to lie down on the grass, observing snails climbing up a bough and clouds floating in the sky. Those who are close to nature know instinctively that humans are to live in harmony with it and can therefore choose the right path to take, without the need for us to scold them constantly about protecting the environment.*

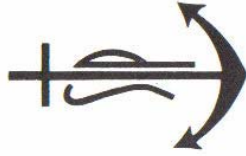
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
